

Epiphany Message for 2021 from Bishop John

Today as we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany it is worth pausing to see how the story of the Wise Men sheds light on our path and helps us to see our calling more clearly.

First, Epiphany speaks about people who went through thick and thin to discover Christ in a turbulent world. As I reflect upon the past nine months, I have seen this happening time and again in parishes across the Archdeaconry. Pastoral care, creative services on site and on line, care for the most vulnerable and giving which enables us to keep going. Thank-you for keeping going through thick and thin. It has been remarkable

Second, Epiphany speaks of discovering Christ in fragility and hiddenness, as the toddler Jesus as part of an ordinary family in the backwaters of the Roman Empire.

In situations like the one we are facing, we often wonder what God is doing. Ultimately only God knows this. However the story of the Epiphany indicates that Christ is to be found in the midst of a turbulent world rather than being outside this world looking in and occasionally jumping in. Epiphany shows us that to redeem the world in a way that loves and respects creation and our freedoms means working inside out rather than outside in; beginning at the bottom rather than taking a top down dominance approach.

Looking ahead we have tough challenges ahead of us as we navigate the turbulence of Covid 19. My prayer for all of you is that you will discover Christ more fully and deeply in this turbulence as you trust and travel towards Christ in our midst. Thank-you for all you are doing. Keep going and keep trusting.

READINGS FOR THE BAPTISM OF CHRIST

A reading from the book of Genesis

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, 'Let there be light'; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.
Genesis 1.1-5

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the inland regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?' They replied, 'No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.' Then he said, 'Into what then were you baptized?' They answered, 'Into John's baptism.' Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied – altogether there were about twelve of them.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord according to Mark

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.' In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'
