A **Ryedale Festival** Late-Night Candlelit Concert was held in church on Tuesday night, with a start time of 9.30pm. It got underway a little later, in fact, as an earlier concert in the Milton Rooms overran and some people had tickets for both. Our Insurers would have been relieved that the numerous miniature candles placed on the shelves of all the pews were not naked flames. A raised platform was placed in front of the chancel steps to accommodate a harpsichord and the pianist, along with players of the viola da gamba, violin and baroque flute (not made of silver and with no keys). The viola da gamba looks similar to a cello and is played in a similar fashion, but it has seven strings, frets and no spike to hold it upright. It's actually a member of the guitar family. We were told that the violin being used was 400 years old! The pieces performed were suitably baroque (by Bach, Handel, Couperin and Telemann) and played with spirit and feeling by a very young ensemble. As the festival programme said, the venue is one of the most atmospheric and historic spaces in the town.

News from Ryedale Foodbank: we are concentrating at the moment on the contents of our School Holiday packs which have started to go out to families with children from this week. The pack also gives an information sheet of snack meals that can be made from Foodbank parcels.

The most useful items at the moment would be: blue UHT milk, cartons of juice, bottles of squash, cereals, tinned macaroni cheese, tinned spaghetti hoops, small tins of ham, tins of tuna, tins of rice pudding, tins of custard, microwave pasta, microwave rice & sponge puddings.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord, according to John

lesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the lews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming towards him, Jesus said to Philip, 'Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, 'Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to Jesus, 'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?' Jesus said, 'Make the people sit down.' Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, 'Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.' So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, 'This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world.' When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the lake, got into a boat, and started across the lake to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The lake became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the lake and coming near the boat, and they were terrified.
